RECIPES

SUFGANIYOT

PAGE 3

Sufganiyot are jelly donuts that are a traditional Hanukkah treat in Israel.

Ingredients

- 1 ball store bought pizza dough or refrigerator biscuit dough
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup seedless raspberry jelly (any flavor jelly is ok, or even Nutella)
- Oil for frying



Prepare Dough

- 1. If using pizza dough: Allow your dough to warm up on the counter for 30 mins to an hour. Roll out the dough to about 1/4 inch thick and use round cookie cutter to cup out circles of dough. If using biscuit dough: flatten and stretch a bit.
- 2. Pour about 2 inches of oil into a walled frying pan. Warm the oil to about 350 degrees. I recommend using a candy thermometer.
- 3. While it's heating, put sugar into a shallow bowl.
- 4. Scoop 1/2 cup of raspberry jam into the corner of a large plastic bag and snip off a small portion of the corner to make a pastry bag.
- 5. Place 2 or 3 rounds of dough into the pan at a time. Flip once the bottom side is lightly brown. Be careful not to over cook.
- 6. When both sides are cooked, place onto paper towels, then toss in the granulated sugar.
- 7. Using a long skewer, make a whole in one side of the donut and wiggle it around to create a cavity inside.
- 8. Squeeze the raspberry jam into the whole in the donut. Don't be scared to put too much in.
- 9. Remember the dough is not sweet, so the filling is key.
- 10. Eat them! Just like everything fried, they're better hot.

KINDERPUNSCH: GERMANY (KID-FRIENDLY HOLIDAY DRINK)

A flavorful hot fruit drink. Goes especially well with freshly baked Christmas cookies and holiday celebrations

Ingredients:

- 16 ounces fruit tea, ideally rosehip
- 16 ounces apple juice
- juice of one lemon
- 3 teaspoons honey

Instructions:

- Brew tea and leave to infuse for 10 minutes.
- Stir in the apple juice, fresh lemon juice and honey. Reheat, until the honey has dissolved completely.
- Serve in festive mugs.

Kwanzaa is a Swahili word the means "first" and signifies the first fruits of the harvest.


Supplies:

- scissors
- glue
- construction paper (brown and various colors to make fruits and vegetables.
- markers

Instructions:

- 1. Cut basket shape out of brown paper. Cut one to paste onto of basket with handles. This is so you can put the vegetables and fruit inside the basket.
- 2. Glue front smaller basket onto larger basket. Make sure you only glue along the sides.
- 3. Cut out vegetable shapes or find some in magazines or from the grocery store paper adds.
- 4. Fill basket with yummy vegetables and fruits you enjoy!













BABY JESUS IN THE MANGER


Supplies:

GROSS MOTOR TRADITIONAL

LUTA DE GALO: BRAZIL

Translation: <u>Luta de Galo</u> means "fight of the rooster" in Portuguese

Equipment:

1 handkerchief, bandana or piece of cloth for each player Number of Players:

Usually played with 2 kids, but more can play

How to Play:

- 1. Tuck the handkerchief/bandana/cloth into a pocket or waistband of each player. Enough of the cloth should be hanging out so it is visible to the other players and so it can be taken by another.
- 2. Players should cross their right arm over across their chest (hence they cannot use it) and try to grab the other person's cloth with their left hand while hopping on only one foot.
- 3. The players then hop around trying to grab each other's handkerchief

FLIP THE LATKE: A HANUKKAH GAME

How to Play:

- 1.Use a light weight frying pan
- 2. Tie or tape a string to the handle and tie the other end onto a bean bag.
- 3. Try to flip the bean bag into the frying pan.

If you don't have a frying pan, you can use a sturdy paper plate in place of the frying pan and a round cut out of a piece of paper in place of the beanbag.

SEVEN STONES GAME: INDIA

How to Play:

1. This game is played by all ages of children in India, and has many rules and instructions to the game. (Feel free to look them up).

FOR YOUNGER CHILDREN:

- 1. Stack up 7 stones onto of each other and as one child throws the ball for a set distance away. Another child can try and catch the ball after it is thrown.
- 2. Each child has 3 turns to try and make the stones fall over.

-- ATTENDANCE:


- Electronic attendance will be collected using either our iPad or personal devices by scanning a QR code.
